Reid said Friday it is too early to turn off the lights.

"The administration has not permanently foreclosed the possibility of such an investment and I remain committed to working with them and with (principal developer) Tony Marnell and XpressWest to secure this vital investment for Nevada," he said.

My wife and I left San Bernardino, CA on 6/23/13 to begin a Guest Rewards train trip to Longview, TX. Metrolink 367 was on time into LAUS. After a wonderful meal on across the street, we settled down to a couple of hours of people watching before we could board the train. A breath of fresh air was an Amtrak employee Eric Richardson who was out in the middle of the station providing everyone with information as to train status, etc. He was energetic and appropriate. He did this right up to the time for us to board # 2 at 9:00 pm. If this is a new innovation, it is an excellent tool to keep travellers informed and Amtrak is to be commended. We decided to start our journey this way rather than board in Palm Springs which is the closest station to us. Boarding at 12:30 am at an unstaffed station was not appealing. The train was basically on time all the was into San Antonio, TX. There we had to change roomettes, since the train was so full, we could not get into the thru car transferred to the Texas Eagle. This as almost painless and

sitting in the San Antonio station gave us a change to meet more people. The train left San Antonio on time and we met La Shonda Hayes. She was our bedroom attendant and was bright, cheerful, capable and available. We have been riding Amtrak since 1986 and she is, without question, the best attendant we have ever had. She is a credit to Amtrak, defiantly a keeper. We arrived Longview, TX fifteen minutes late which I consider highly acceptable.
